CALL TO ACTION

TELL CONGRESS TO OPPOSE CUTS TO THE FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

Background

Congress is considering making \$3 billion in cuts to the Food Stamp Program and other federal food programs over the next five years. These cuts would be achieved through policy changes that would restrict access to Food Stamps, either across the board or for certain populations, such as immigrants or working families. The Agriculture Committees in charge of food programs are expected to make recommendations to Congress for achieving these cuts by September 16, 2005.

Cuts to the Food Stamp Program could leave hundreds of thousands of low-income Texans without the help they need to feed their families. In 2004, more than 2.3 million Texans relied on Food Stamps to make ends meet, which poured over \$2.2 billion in federal Food Stamp revenue to the Texas economy. CPPP estimates that five million Texans are actually eligible for Food Stamps, which means that millions of low-income Texans may be eligible for food assistance but not getting it. It also means we are leaving billions of our tax dollars in Washington that could be used to support low-income families and bolster the Texas economy. CPPP estimates that if Texas reached just 60 percent of the eligible population, it would bring an additional \$900 million in federal revenue to the Texas economy.
